

JEROME FOUNDATION ANNOUNCES \$5.5M IN GRANTS TO 79 ARTS ORGANIZATIONS IN MINNESOTA AND NEW YORK CITY

SAINT PAUL, MN, April 9, 2024 — Jerome Foundation is honored to announce the 79 recipients—including 22 new recipients—of grants totaling \$5,543,000 through its Arts Organization Grants program. These flexible two-year grants support Minnesota and New York City-based arts organizations that offer ongoing programs, services and/or opportunities for multiple early career generative artists and culture bearers to create, develop, and present new original work. Funded programs serve artists in and across the artistic fields of dance; film, video and digital production; literature; music; technology-centered arts; theater, performance, spoken word; and visual arts.

The 2024–2026 cohort of grantee organizations aligns strongly with Jerome Foundation's values of equity, defined as intersectional racial equity, diversity, risk, innovation, and humility. All grantees offer artists vital resources and opportunities and are active as part of a larger ecosystem of support for early career artists across the five boroughs of New York City and throughout urban and rural Minnesota. These grants contribute to hundreds of opportunities for artists through residencies, mentorships, fellowships, professional and new work development programs, productions, and commissions, laying the groundwork for current and future creative experiences across multiple artistic fields.

Board Chair Kate Barr stated, "The board of directors is proud to support this dynamic roster of nonprofit organizations that play an essential role in nurturing and championing early career artists. Our commitment to ongoing multi-year support is a recognition of the long-term nature of these relationships and the significant impact of these organizations."

Applications were accepted through an open call process and evaluated by artists and arts professionals in each artistic field with a deep knowledge and experience of the arts ecosystems in Minnesota and New York City. Reviewers considered four criteria: the merit of the organization's work with early career generative artists; the organizational feasibility and capacity to deliver programs and opportunities; the potential impact for participating artists and the field; and the demonstrated achievement in and alignment with Jerome Foundation's core values.

President & CEO Eleanor Savage stated, "As Jerome Foundation moves into our 60th year of grantmaking, we remain committed in vision and action to investing in artists and arts organizations, supporting the invaluable roles they play in making meaning, telling untold stories, and shifting worldviews. We are honored to contribute to the vibrant creative communities in Minnesota and New York City, continuing the legacy of our founder, Jerome Hill. As we move into our next decade, we are engaged with one of the essential calls of this time—to address equity and reckon with inequity—in our grantmaking and investments."
